BORED DOGS OR BORED HANDLERS?

Sitting at ringside can be a discouraging business at times. If you sit around long enough you will hear that every breed from Borzois to Beagles dislikes obedience because they bore so easily. Only the big three (Poodles, Shelties and Goldens) are exempt from criticism. I'll always remember the man with the Golden Retriever who was bemoaning the fact that nobody believed how easily distracted and bored his Golden was. "I wish I had a St. Bernard," he muttered, "then they would believe me."

Elaine C. Newman addressed the problem in her January 1979 column as her Thought for the New Year and I couldn't agree more. She said: "Dull, bored or disinterested dogs are not born. They are carefully trained that way. Your dog's attitude toward obedience is in most cases a direct reflection of YDUR attitude toward training!"

Most of us can remember a special teacher: one who took an ordinary subject and gave it life. A good handler does the same thing. He or she makes heeling, halting and, in short, learning exciting for the dog. For those of you who feel that certain obedience exercises don't save any purpose because the dog doesn't use them daily, remember that learning for the sake of learning is as important to our four-footed friends as it is to us.





The new Award Requirement structure is effective immediately. This counts for all positions held as of January 1, 1995. Each available "job" in the club has been assigned a work credit. There are three categories based on the amount of time that is spent by an individual performing the job. Each category will be worth One, Two or Three credits. The credits are listed below. A total of 6 credits are the requirements for receiving an award. The Meeting requirement has not been changed, a minimum of Three meetings must be attended.

The following are worth ONE credit:

- Steward or Judge a Match
- Work the Front Desk one night
- Serve on a Committee
- 1/2 day at the November Trial

The following are worth TETO stedits:

- Serve as Chairperson on a Committee
- Assistant Instructor for Puppy or Beginner Class
- Assistant Instructor per quarter for advanced classes
- Serve on the Board
- Full day at the November Trial

The following are worth THREE credits:

- Primary Instructor for Puppy or Beginner class
- Primary Instructor per quarter for advanced classes
- Two day Tracking Test
- Serve as the Puppy/Beginner Class Coordinator

THE ELUSIVE TITLE

Trying to get a U.D. title on a dog is, for most of us, the world's most ego-deflating experience.

First come the long and arduous hours of training. You must somehow impart to your four-footed Companion Dog Excellent that these new exercises can be learned, and that they're really no more difficult than the ones in Open. Confusion usually takes over for a while, and care must be taken to provide maximal encouragement and minimal discouragement to both concerned parties. Suddenly you need lots of room and lots of time for practice — the Novice and Open exercises can be confined to a driveway, lawn or basement. Not so Utility.

Finally, though, you feel the dog knows the exercises. Few mistakes are being made at home or in class. So you take the plunge and enter a few shows. The balloon bursts — good grief, the dog didn't do <u>any</u>thing right! And, of course, you goofed up here and there, because the Utility routine is new to you. Well, better luck next time.

At the next show, the dog manages one or two correct responses, but still far from qualifying. And the third time is similar to the second, except that different exercises are "blown."

Each time, you go home and work on the rough spots, but the dog does beautifully there, and obviously understands all exercises quite well. So you enter more shows.

Soon, along comes an "encouragement show." Here the dog does everything, except for one part of one exercise. Sure, you still don't qualify, but your spirits are lifted — now you know the dog can do it.

The "encouragement show" is followed by the "back to square one show." Nothing is done correctly! Then come the experiences of goofing on a different exercise each time, so that you can't bear down on any one exercise in training.

You meet the same people at every show. Some are successful eventually. For instance, recently in Utility A class there were 16 entries — one of these qualified! Looking at it from the positive side, that one dog got a leg. And the other 15 will be at the next show, because just as you're determined to give it all up. (why do I want a U.D. on this dumb old dog, anyway?), along comes another "encouragement show." You can't quit when you're that close — maybe next time...?!
