After an introduction to the process you will participate in designing programs to use Classical conditioning to improve obedience or solve serious behavior problems for demonstration dogs.

<u>Diagnosing and Treating Aggression in Dogs:</u> This workshop will enhance your ability to understand canine aggression toward people and/or other dogs. The entire day will be devoted to aggression: first, diagnosing why an individual is acting aggressively, and understanding what the triggering stimuli are that elicit the aggression. After a thoughtful evaluation, we will communally develop a treatment plan and implement the initial stages of treatment for each demonstration dog. (Any dogs at risk of causing injury will be muzzled.) She is currently the owner of Dog's Best Friend, Ltd., a training and consulting business that offers family dog training classes and diagnosis and treatment for serious behavioral problems in companion animals. She is Assistant Adjunct Professor in Zoology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, teaching "The Biology and Philosophy of Human/Animal Relationships" in Zoology and Wildlife Ecology, and "Small Animal Ethology" to students of Veterinary Medicine. Co-host of Public Radio International's "Calling All Pets," Dr. McConnell gives advice about behavior problems over many stations across the country. She is Chair of the Issues in Applied Animal Behavior for the Animal Behavior Society of North America. Besides raising and training Border collies in sheep herding competitions, she travels extensively from her farm in Black Earth, Wisconsin, giving speeches and seminars around the country.

TO FVDTC Board Members:

The awards committee has undertaken conducting a survey of members to assess their opinions on the awards given. Although in the past this committee has had the ability to set award levels and actual awards given, we feel that given the amount of "discussion" on all sides surrounding the awards and the money spent, we thought we should ask the members, who we represent, how they want to see their money spent. This committee believes it is our primary responsibility to respond to the members wishes. This letter, along with other attachments, outlines the results of the survey and how the committee plans to proceed to bring the awards in line with the member wishes. The details regarding the actual awards offered will be presented at a later date.

All members were sent the survey and were asked to participate in the survey. Members were also contacted by phone to remind them of the deadline and their opportunity to express their opinions on this subject. Some exceptions to those contacted: members out of state, with no phone number, those who could not be reached. We feel this is a more efficient method than bringing this subject up in an open meeting where there would no doubt be heated discussion which is rarely productive. Many members expressed their reluctance to attend a meeting on this subject, feeling that they could not openly express their opinions without fear of backlash. This method also allowed for participation for the maximum amount of members. Given the sensitive nature of this subject we felt the survey was the best opportunity to poll the members, as well as a more expedient method. Many members stated that they preferred the survey/private vote method and this committee intends to use this method for future discussion.

62 members have responded out of about 100 training members. The non-training members who did respond (7) are still active in Club activities or were very active when they were training members. The most recent members (6) did not receive the survey (they joined after it went out) and most members who joined in 1997 (or after 1996 dues) did not respond(18). Several training members (8) did not respond because they did not have an interest in the awards program for several reasons, including they only belong to have a different place to train, or have pets and will not be showing. Many members listed as training members have not participated in any club functions in the last 2 years (28). The number of respondents clearly exceed the number of members who would attend a meeting on this subject.

AKC AWARDS

The members are happy with the amount they think we are spending on the AKC awards, with the exception of the OTCH which they think is too high. For AKC Agility the members think the amount we spend is just right, yet the members overwhelmingly want to offer AKC Agility awards and at the same level as AKC Obedience.

The members want to offer the CT at the same level as the OTCH. (But we need to lower the amount for this level)

We will try to bring the AKC awards more in line with what the members want to spend and work out some way to include Agility awards. This issue will likely be brought to the members again.

CKC AWARDS

The members think we spend too much on CKC (with the exception of the CD and CH which they think is the right amount).

UKC AWARDS

The members want to offer awards for UKC Obedience and Agility. There is a split between offering this at CKC level versus just certificates.

The committee has a proposal for CKC and UKC awards.

REQUIREMENTS

The members overwhelmingly agree that we are asking for the right amount of meetings and work credits to be eligible for awards. The members also overwhelmingly agree that in order to be eligible for awards a member must train at the club at least 12 times or more per year. This would not include match nights. In order to allow for "start up" and pro-rating we would like to require the members attend training at least 5 times during the remaining portion of 1997 in order to be eligible for awards. This would become effective July 3, 1997 (in the meantime we would put out flyers and publish the details in Waggin' Tales). The Awards Committee along with the Statistician have worked out a system for keeping track of member attendance.

AWARDS CATEGORIES

The members would like to see category levels for awards. The awards committee will work on setting up levels for each title and designating those awards in each level. We will offer the members the opportunity to chose from any lower level as well as "buy up" to a higher level.

The members want to reinstate the Aldythe Comstock award as it was (TD &TDX)

Follow up notes: Several members (3) submitted their suveys after the deadline and so their surveys were not in this summary. Their answers will be looked at by the committee, but do not change the results. The board did not want to re-instate the training requirement.

A couple items we want you to know about: Tracking "classes" are being held every Sunday morning - all members are invited - it was written on the board at training when classes started in May. There are several new members participating. There are also smaller groups going out at other times. See a tracking person for details - or Wally O'Brien. Perhaps instructors need to tell their classes about this. I had an instructor refer someone to me who wanted to track. Also, regarding UKC, there are many members who show in UKC. There are many obedience and agility trials in this area. Most times there are two obedience trials in one day and two agility trials in one weekend. UKC will let mixed breeds compete in obedience and agility and earn titles as well as placements. Perhaps this would be of interest to those individuals in our classes who have mixed breeds?


