



UPCOMING DELEGATE'S MEETING

The Delegates to The American Kennel Club will be holding their quarterly meeting on June 9th at the Renaissance St. Louis Airport Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. Over 160 Delegates are expected to attend.

Topics of discussion include:

- Reports from the Delegates' Dog Shows Rules
 Committee concerning the pilot program of placing identification stickers on crates at certain shows;
- A report from the Delegates' All-Breed Club Committee on site territoriality;
- A discussion by Dr. Paula Henthorn (University of Pennsylvania) on the discovery of the gene responsible for Cystinuria in Newfoundlands.
- Special presentations on AKC's Future Vision.
- Amendments to the Club's Bylaws (concerning the reading of amendments, changes to Dachshund Field Trial Rules, changes to the Retriever Field Trial
- The establishment of a new Restricted All-Age Stake.

It is expected that these amendments will be voted on at the Delegates' September meeting, which will be held back in New York City.

AKC UNVEILS NEW VISION

... Ever improving customer focused provider of leadership and information to those who appreciate purebred dogs. . .

The American Kennel Club hosted a small gathering of active dog fanciers in Raleigh, North Carolina on May 27th and 28th to unveil its plans for the future.

Input is Vital

Al Cheaure explained to the attendees that AKC was seeking their ideas, suggestions and thoughts as it moves forward to the 21st century. A concentrated effort is being made by the Kennel Club to reach out to the fancy in joint cooperation while providing top-quality, timely and valued services. The Kennel Club is embracing the coming Millennium ... [with] ... resolve to do everything possible to meet the

needs and desires of its customers - those individuals who own, raise and/or exhibit purebred dogs. It is clear that AKC's emphasis, planning and money is being spent on re-engineering the company's culture (both internally and externally), business processes, and computer system:- all designed to place the Kennel Club in a better position to serve those customers, their dogs and events.

Plans are in the works for AKC to use the Internet and its Website to connect with those involved in the world of purebred dogs. When completed, this redesigned and reformatted Website will consist of three principal sections:

an on-line newspaper featuring breaking news, explanation and impact of Delegate and Board decisions, timely articles and stories about purebred dogs, their owners and events, conformation and performance panels, schedules and direct coverage, and information about the AKC - its departments; a statistical and library division comprised of AKC's Rules, Regulations, Policies, Guidelines, Statistics, and other written materials; and lastly, an e-commerce area that will permit on-line transactions for information, services and goods. At some point in the near future, fanciers will be able to get show reports for individual dogs, do pedigree matching, acquire breeding results, judging statistics, and event planning and just about anything else. It is also anticipated that the various applications - events, judging and even registration - will be able to be completed on-line for quick and efficient service.

- Recording information will be done with ease, speed and accuracy and be able to be done using a variety of methods;
- 2. What comes out of the registration process will be of higher quality than at present;
- A. The speed and efficiency of the registration process will exceed current levels;
- 4. An ability to identify classes of customers and dogs;
- **5.** Information will be accessible at any point in the process;
- **C.** Registration will integrate with the business of the AKC; and
- 7. The registration processes and system will safeguard and enhance the AKC's role as archivist for the sport of purebred dogs.

Results

The re-engineering project is expected to cost approximately \$7 million over the life of the project. It will save AKC not only in personnel costs, but also in needless duplication, as well as the unnecessary errors and delays that today can frustrate and anger AKC customers, constituents and staff members. It will also give AKC the ability to provide additional services and information to the fancy. Additional services and data, combined with better customer service, will be offered by an enhanced organization supported by a dedicated, caring staff that has the proper tools to function to the best of its ability - AKC's re-engineering will provide just those tools and the beneficiary will be the world of purebred dogs.

A video is also going to be distributed to clubs to enable these organizations to share AKC's Vision with their members.

Lyme Disease

The onset of warmer weather brings out fleas and ticks in an on-going battle that we must fight every spring. One of the biggest concerns with the beginning of "tick season" is Lyme disease.

What Is Lyme Disease?

Lyme Disease is an infectious disease that is most commonly spread by the deer tick. The deer tick can be found in grassy areas (including your lawn), and in brush and wooded areas. Not only does it affect man, but it can also affect other domesticated and wild animals including our dogs. Lyme disease has been reported throughout the United States. While not all ticks carry this disease, dog owners should be ever vigilant..

What Do You Do If You Find A Tick On Your Dog?

During the warm weather, check your dog every day for ticks. The faster a tick is detected and removed, the chances of getting Lyme Disease are decreased. The best way to remove a tick is to grasp it gently with tweezers, as close to the dog's skin as possible, and pull it straight off. Be careful not to squeeze the tick as it can cause more bacteria to be spread. Fingers, matches, Vaseline, nail polish, and alcohol are not proper ways to remove ticks. Once the tick has been removed, it is recommended by veterinarians that, if possible, the tick be stored in a tight container with a small amount of rubbing alcohol. In the event your dog develops any problems, the tick can be identified as a carrier by your vet..

What Are the Symptoms of Lyme Disease?

Some of the more common signs in dogs are loss of appetite, joint pain, and fever. These symptoms can occur as early as a few days of the tick bite. If these symptoms are ignored and left untreated, the dog may develop further complications including heart problems, severe lameness, paralysis, joint swelling and brain damage. In some cases, there are no outward symptoms until the disease has reached advanced stages. Therefore, it is important to keep a vigilant eye on your pet for any outward signs of feeling out of sorts.

If you suspect any of the above symptoms in your dog, you will need to take the dog to your Veterinarian. Be prepared to tell the Veterinarian when you located the tick on your dog, present the tick, if you have it, and relate any symptoms you have noticed. Some veterinarian will perform a blood test to assist in the diagnoses.

What Is The Treatment for Lyme Disease?

If caught early, Lyme Disease can be treated with antibiotics. Usually within a few days, the dog will begin to respond positively to the antibiotics. If the disease is not caught until it is in the advanced stage, it may be harder to treat as the dog may develop lasting damage. In the advanced stage, the disease is much slower to respond to antibiotics and may require a much lengthier period of treatment. Obviously, the key is to catch it early.

Lyme Disease Prevention

The best way to avoid getting Lyme Disease is to practice a good prevention program. Keeping your dog in shorter grass and out of the woods and brush will help to minimize tick exposure. There are many commercial sprays and powders available for treating your yard. If you decide to use one of these products, be sure to read all directions and warnings on these packages before you begin the treatment. Not all of these products are suitable for use around animals. There are also many flea and tick sprays, powders, collars and skin applications available that offer good protection for your dog. In addition, there is a fairly new vaccine for Lyme Disease available from your Veterinarian. Consult with your Vet on the pros and cons of such a vaccine, if you choose this route. For people interested in homeopathic treatments, nosodes is also an option.


